

UROLOGIC ONCOLOGIST

The Department of Surgery, Alberta Health Services (Calgary Zone) and the University of Calgary invite applications for a full-time, clinical urologist position.

Required qualifications include an MD, a Fellowship in the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in Urology and additional fellowship training in uro-oncology. Expertise in prostate cryotherapy and a defined research focus are considered assets. Candidates must be eligible for licensure in the province of Alberta.

The successful candidate will become a member of the Section of Urology and provide urological care in the Calgary area, including clinical activities at Rockyview General Hospital and the South Health Campus. Teaching at the undergraduate and post-graduate level will be required. Committee duties will be expected as the need arises, and proven leadership skills are desirable. Successful applicants will take call in accordance with site and zone policies.

The successful individual will be expected to have a clinical appointment with the University of Calgary, Cumming School of Medicine and the Department of Surgery. Academic duties will include medical student and resident teaching and clinical or basic science research in urologic oncology.

In accordance with Canadian immigration requirements, priority will be given to Canadian citizens and permanent residents of Canada. Alberta Health Services and the University of Calgary are committed to employment equity.

Calgary Highlights:

Calgary is approximately 80km east of the Canadian Rockies and is located in the transition zone between the Rocky Mountain Foothills and the Canadian prairies. It is the largest city in Alberta, with a metropolitan population of 1,239,220 people (StatisticsCanada, 2016). The city is large in physical area, consisting of an inner city surrounded by suburban communities of various densities.

Calgary's climate is greatly influenced by the city's elevation and proximity to the Rocky Mountains. Calgary's winters are broken up by warm, dry Chinook winds that routinely blow into the city from over the mountains during the winter months.

Calgary has a vibrant theatre, art, food, sports and music community. It was designated as one of the cultural capitals of Canada in 2012. The city features an eclectic mix of restaurants and bars, cultural venues, public squares and shopping.
